Baxter provides preview to careers in auto industry

Luis Cortez-Molina, an Omaha Bryan senior, and Drew Jones, a Metropolitan Community College freshman, literally have their feet inside the doors of careers in the automobile industry.

The past two months they have worked at Baxter Auto's Lexus dealership, detailing cars in the service department. Cortez-Molina hopes to one day have a career in auto-collision. Jones is seeking to earn an associate's degree in auto technology at MCC.

"I like it a lot," Jones said. "I am really interested in cars, so it's all fun."

Cortez-Molina is looking forward to receiving an Aksarben-Horatio Alger scholarship that would enable him to attend MCC and enroll in the auto-collision program.

Over the past two years, Baxter Auto has partnered with Avenue Scholars Foundation to introduce students to careers in the automo-

bile industry. Since 2015, they have employed 11 students at four locations: Chrysler at Bellevue, Lexus at 13025 West Dodge Road, Mercedes at 14335 Hillsdale Ave, and Subaru at Westroads.

Janelle Hyman, Talent Acquisition Partner for Baxter, says working with Avenue Scholars Foundation has been beneficial for everyone.

"Baxter's partnership with Avenue Scholars has given students the opportunity to utilize their skills by

growing and developing within our organization," Hyman said.

Last April, Baxter hosted 30 to 40 Avenue Scholars at its Lexus dealership to provide information about the opportunities in the automobile industry. Hyman said demonstration stations were set up for jobs in sales, financial, detailing, office, administration, and other areas.

"It's all about the kids," Hyman said. "It's an opportunity to see them grow."

Driving school prepares Scholars for test

In the United States, powered mostly by a car-driven workforce, having a drivers' license is a high priority. Bob's Driving School has been an invaluable resource in helping Avenue Scholars achieve this goal.

"Over the summer ASF sponsored eight students to go through a Driver's Education Course through Bob's Driving School to help progress them on their path of obtaining their Driver's License," said Kelly Bernadt, Student Support Coordinator. "Some students had little to no experience behind the wheel, while others after the week of classroom and driving instruction were able to take and pass the driving test, ultimately getting their license."

The eight students are all attending Metropolitan Community College this fall: Jonathan Smith, Dylan Gladden, Lana Zellner, Phillip Demi, Alycia

Reed, Caitlyn Hall, Alison Martins, and Mamnungu Hamadi.

Bernadt said Hamadi was the only one of the eight who actually got her license within that week of the class, but noted the others were continuing to prepare and study before attempting to obtain their license this fall.

"Transportation is a

barrier that many of our students face in their path to a career. Our goal is to help students gain this independent living skill so they will be able to provide their own reliable transportation and not have to rely on public transit, cabs, friends, or family," Bernadt said. "Get-

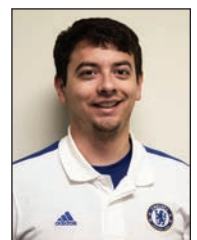

Chavez-Perez climbing career ladder at BCBS

“They don’t let you stop!”

For Adriana Chavez-Perez, that never-give-up attitude instilled in her through Avenue Scholars Foundation staff has been the key factor in her rise to a full-time, good salary position at Blue Cross Blue Shield.

Chavez-Perez was recently promoted to Coordination of Benefits Specialist, a position that provides a \$35,000 salary. She says former Omaha Bryan Talent Advisor Emily Christensen, Student Support Coordinator Kelly Bernadt and Career Talent Advisor Albert Varas gave her the push she needed to succeed.

“She (Christensen) helped me quite a bit,” Chavez-Perez said. “She stressed the importance of being on time. I always received a lot of support, especially when I had a baby. The whole Foundation, in general, is a lot about support and guidance. They really make sure you get where you want to be. They don’t let you stop. They don’t let you give up. It’s been amazing to me.

“I really like the job I have now; it’s thanks to the program and their [connections] to so many organizations,” she said. “It’s helped me a lot with my daughter. I can raise her on my own without any help.”



Chavez-Perez says the birth of her daughter, Alayna, now a 1-year-old, “motivates me a little more. Before I didn’t really have a reason to try hard. Now I do. I can’t stop. I can’t give up.”

Another benefit of working for BCBS is tuition reimbursement, which Chavez-Perez plans to take advantage of to achieve her goal of earning a bachelor’s degree in Business Administration and Management at the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Ultimately, she would like to advance in the BCBS organization because “I really like it there. Everyone’s friendly. There are many advancement opportunities. If I can, I would really to stay there, make my career there.”

Desire to help people drives North grad

Laying carpet is paying the bills, but his Career Talent Advisor convinced Kai-Jahn Henry he was capable of building a more promising career by enrolling in the criminal justice program at Metropolitan Community College.

Now, with an Associate’s Degree in Criminal Justice in hand, Henry is ready to take the next step toward becoming a police officer or sheriff. The journey, however, has not been easy.

“The first year [at MCC] was hard; I didn’t know if I was going to get through it,” Henry said. “I sat down with [my advisor] again, and he said to just keeping fighting through it. Three years later I graduated with my Criminal Justice degree.”



The next step is take the “COPS” exam this month. Once Henry takes the exam, his scores will be sent out to the police department.

“I am preparing to do the best I can,” Henry said.

Career Talent Advisor Albert Varas has helped Henry find additional motivation, including “some ride-alongs” with a patrol officer. Henry also had some built-in motivation.

“I have had some people not believing in me,” he said. “I had to prove *them* wrong, not just prove *myself* right.”

Henry believes becoming a police officer would fulfill his goal of having a career focused on helping people.

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“Our mission is to ensure careers for students of hope and need through education and supportive relationships.”

Bob Grabowski, who retired from Omaha Public Schools schools after a 40-year career, has owned his driving school for five years.

Throughout his teaching career, Grabowski worked part-time as a driving school instructor.

In his association with Avenue Scholars Foundation the past two years, his primary goal has been to "get them ready for the test."

Grabowski often transports the students to the DMV and allows him/her to drive his car for the test.

Grabowski says that during his training, "I go over attitude a lot – the idea of taking it [driving]

seriously."

For Hamadi, an Omaha South graduate, passing her driver's test was a big moment.

"Bob's Driving School helped me so much," she said. "If you pay attention and listen, everything will become easy. I was so excited that I could finally drive and be able to go where I want without an adult sitting next to me," Hamadi said.
