



GET ON THE CAREER EXPRESS

Avenue Scholars Foundation

is the vehicle that helps take students from low-income families to each stop along the career line. Students receive comprehensive support – including academic, social and financial planning services – from high school, through post-secondary education/training and into a career. Along the way, each student receives the support of a High School and Career Talent Advisor.

AKSARBEN Foundation

is the central station that provides the "fare" for students from low-income families to reach their career destination. Their business partners provide job opportunities at each stop along the career line. Together, they help students seeking high-demand, high-skill occupations arrive at meaningful careers in the community.



Metropolitan Community College

represents each stop along the career line. Eligible students will receive an \$8,000 scholarship over two years, funded by the AKSARBEN Foundation & MCC, to continue their education in a career or technical program. College Success Navigators from MCC provide students with individualized guidance and support as they advance through their coursework/training at MCC and transition to a career.

SCHOLAR PROFILES



CODY AVAIOS

After recently signing a three-year contract with Lexus of Omaha, Cody Avalos, is confident his life is on the right track.

Upon completing the Automotive Technology program at Metropolitan Community College this May, Avalos will start fulfilling his contract obligations as a full-time auto technician at Lexus. Since December 1, 2016 Avalos has been employed as a part-time technician at Lexus.

"I really like Lexus," Avalos said. "They have been flexible on fitting my work schedule around my classes at MCC." Avalos, a 2015 Omaha Northwest graduate, is thankful Avenue Scholars Foundation was there to pick him up during a "rough" patch at the beginning of his college career.

"Avenue Scholars keeps me in check," he said. "They support me. They have invested in me and pushed me in the right direction." After completing the Automotive Technology program, Avalos will be taking a few more classes to obtain his Associate degree in General Education. In three years, he might decide to stay with Lexus, or he might pursue other interests.

"I might try welding," Avalos said. "My dad was really good at it, and I did very well in it during the class we had to take as part of the program [at MCC]." Avalos says he has also thought of starting his own business — franchises or investments – noting that his grandpa was in the restaurant business, and his mom has experience in business management.

"So, I got a little picture of how it [the restaurant business] works," Avalos said. With the help of Avenue Scholars Foundation, Avalos sees a bright picture, regardless of the career choices he makes. "I am so confident now that I try to help guide and support others who are struggling to get on the right track," he said.

OLIVIA GARCIA

For Olivia Garcia, 23, life is good right now. In November, she was promoted to a Team Leader position at Blue Cross Blue Shield of Nebraska. She and her husband, Omar, are the parents of a 1-year-old girl, Olivette.

"I feel really accomplished," Garcia says. "We have such a beautiful home. We have a beautiful child, two cars, and two dogs. I am really happy for all we have. We are blessed." It has been a long and rewarding journey since Garcia graduated from Ralston High School in 2011.

As an Avenue Scholar, Garcia was undecided about her career goals, but she was leaning toward "becoming a teacher." Her Talent Advisor convinced her to obtain an Associate Liberal Arts Transfer degree from Metropolitan Community College, which she accomplished in 2014. However, she had also enrolled in the inaugural internship program at BCBS in 2013.

"I never ended up transferring, " Garcia said. "The internship program was going well. I really liked it. Then, the company offered a part-time job and more benefits." In November 2016 Garcia applied for the Team Leader position in the Information Imaging Center & Data Entry Operations & Clerks department. She has 24 employees under her supervision. The position means receiving a full-time salary and full benefits. It also means increased responsibilities.

"It's a big jump for me," Garcia said. "As a part-time employee, I could just blend into the background. Now, as the team leader I have to tell people what to do and know what everyone is doing. I have to be connected to each of my team members, and I have to stand out. The 'crucial conversations' part of the job is difficult. I am still learning because that is really hard for me. The trainer in my area says I am too nice. She is toughening me up."

Garcia appreciates the guidance and support she has received throughout her journey.

"I would never have pictured myself in this position," she said. "I definitely have Avenue Scholars Foundation to thank for that."





JAQUAN CLEMENTS

The lessons Jaquan Clements learned in his own life helped the 2011 Omaha Benson graduate find his niche in a Human Services position at Boys Town in 2016. As an Assistant Family Teacher, Clements helps manage a Boys Town home that includes eight high school students.

"It's eight different boys, eight different personalities," Clements says. "I teach them skills, manners, how to get over difficult situations. Life lessons. How to deal with a problem rather than running from a problem." The students range from grades 9 through 12.

"I am definitely suited for this [job] because I had so much adversity in my own life," Clements said. "I can relate and I can give helpful advice to those in similar situations. Mine were maybe even worse." Those situations include — during his freshmen year in high school — having a car pull up beside Clements and a friend, and individuals in that car threatening to shoot them. "I think it was a case of mistaken identity," he said. "You could see the qun, hear the qun. It got me thinking I could die tomorrow, especially considering the environment I was in. Things actually got worse for me from there. I got into some real trouble." Avenue Scholars came into the picture soon after Clements came back to school after an incident.

'A cousin, when I came back, told me 'we're in Avenue Scholars.' I did not even picture graduating from high school, let alone walking across the stage," he said. "Avenue Scholars put that image [high school graduation] in my head, and here I am today, being able to tell about it."

Clements received an Associate degree in General Studies from Metropolitan Community College in 2016. While working at Boys Town, he is also taking two classes at the University of Nebraska Omaha. Clements now envisions a career in Human Services, whether continuing at Boys Town, working for a non-profit, or becoming a high school counselor.

DESTINY MONTANEZ

For Destiny Montanez, 19, the greatest inspiration has always been her 17-year-old brother, Tommy.

"I plan to be a Special Education teacher," Montanez says. "My brother is autistic. He goes to school with me [at Omaha Benson]. He should be graduating next year; I'm very excited about that." This May, Montanez will graduate from Benson and enroll at Metropolitan Community School, with plans to earn an Associate degree in Childhood Development. Making big adjustments in her life is nothing new for Montanez, considering her family moved to Omaha from California in December of her sixth grade year.

"Immediately when we stepped off the plane, it was freezing cold; that was a shock," she said. "Plus, it was like going backward for me going from being in middle school [as a sixth grader] back to elementary school. However, it's been good. Everyone is nice, and there are a lot more opportunities for my family here." One of those opportunities was to join the Avenue Scholars program during her junior year.


"Since I have always been around Special Education kids, I didn't originally look into it, but Avenue Scholars actually helped me realize I love teaching, and I love being around kids," she said. "It's a little bit cheesy, but being around Special Education kids, you get to see them smile. When you understand them and get to show them you understand them, they smile. They shine. I love to see that every single day." Montanez hopes to some day work with high school kids. She realizes how much time and patience will be required of her as a Special Education teacher. Her focus would be to especially help older students understand what life will be like after high school.



AVENUE SCHOLARS ENROLLMENT



OPENING DOORS TO GREAT WORK

At Avenue Scholars Foundation, we don't simply focus on graduation rates. We want to make sure each of our students is prepared to move on to a meaningful, financially sustaining career in the community. Every ASF student is supported to gain part-time work from the time they enter the program until they are ultimately in a career. In July 2016, 56% of the high school students and 88% of the post-secondary students in ASF's program held part-time jobs, exceeding the 53.2% national employment rate for 16-to-24-year-olds measured by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in July of that year.

CAREER TALENT ADVISORS



JOB-READY PLACEMENT

- Talent Advisors and Navigators work together to ensure career placement at the appropriate time. Talent Advisors provide continued support during the first 6 months of employment.
- AKSARBEN Foundation will work with member businesses to identify potential employment opportunities and networking relationships to create a pool of jobs.
