Youth Business Community Partnerships

Launched by Avenue Scholars in partnership with the Millard Public Schools in early 2019, the Intern Omaha program draws together youth, schools, and employers from across the community in a collective effort to provide year-long, co-curricular, paid internships for high school seniors in high-demand industries, including information technology, trades/manufacturing, auto/diesel technology, and business. The initiative provides opportunities to AS students, as well as seniors in participating metro-area school districts – Blair Community Schools, Douglas County West Community Schools, Millard Public Schools, Ralston Public Schools, and Westside Community Schools.

The program has experienced steady growth since its inception. The program served 28 interns in its pilot year in 2019-20, 51 in 2020-21, and 105 in the 2021-22 cohort. The 105 students participating in the 2021-22 cohort are employed by 57 businesses in 76 unique roles.

Career EdVantage Southwest Iowa

Through the generous support of the Charles E. Lakin Foundation, Avenue Scholars expanded its program model into southwest Iowa with the launch of Career EdVantage Southwest Iowa in 2019.

Now in its third program year, Career EdVantage is serving 130 students across eight partner school districts:

- AHSTW (Avoca, Hancock, Shelby, Tennant, and Walnut) Community School District;
- Glenwood Community School District;
- Lewis Central Community School District;
- Riverside Community School District;
- Shenandoah Community School District;
- Treynor Community School District;
- Tri-Center Community School District; and
- Underwood Community School District.

At full scale, Career EdVantage is expected to serve approximately 400 students across its program – 200 each at both the high school and postsecondary levels.

Career EdVantage placed 54 students into internships with 46 businesses during the summer of 2021 in fields such as computer networking, software programming, automotive technology, diesel technology, surgical technology, culinary arts, welding, dental assisting, electrical engineering, construction, and machining. The organization's goal is to place 100 students into internships in the summer of 2022.





Since 2008, Avenue Scholars (AS) has provided individualized support services to help students

HIGH SCHOOL -

ELIGIBLE STUDENTS

Students are selected for the program during their sophomore year based on financial need (eligibility for free or reduced-price school lunches or a federal Pell Grant), interest in pursuing a career in a high-demand career field requiring an associate degree or less, and SUHIOR YEAR attendance at an AS partner high school.

HIGH SCHOOL CAREER COACHES

At the high school level, each Avenue Scholar is supported by a High School Career Coach, who guides students' personal and career-related development through intrusive personal support and teaches for-credit courses to Avenue Scholars in partner high schools.

POSTSECONDARY

AVENUE SCHOLARS POSTSECONDARY TRAINING GRANT

Students who successfully complete the Avenue Scholars High School Program have the opportunity to continue their education through a grant of up to \$8,000 per student, funded jointly by The Suzanne and Walter Scott Foundation and Metropolitan Community College (MCC). Scholarships support training toward a market-relevant credential in a high-demand career field requiring an associate degree or less. Throughout their postsecondary training, students are jointly supported by AS Postsecondary Career Coaches and MCC College Success Navigators.



COLLEGE SUCCESS NAVIGATORS

MCC College Success Navigators provide expertise in designated career fields of study and managing MCC-related processes, such as course registration, financial aid, etc.

POSTSECONDARY CAREER COACHES

AS Postsecondary Career Coaches provide individualized support to help students develop the a career. Postsecondary Career Coaches continue to support students for six months following

BUSINESS OUTREACH & ENGAGEMENT

AS Business Outreach Coordinators engage with area businesses to provide career-building opportunities, such as career exploration events, part-time and full-time employment, to students throughout the Avenue Scholars program.

STUDENT SUPPORT

In addition to the dedicated support provided by AS Career Coaches, Avenue Scholars also have access to specialized services of AS Student individual support, group programming, and referrals to community resources to help students meet basic life and social/emotional needs.

A committed AS participant demonstrates work-ready habits and skills, including responsibility, work ethic, communication, positive attitude, professionalism, teamwork, and problem solving.

4) ATTENDANCE

A committed AS participant demonstrates consistent attendance at school, work, and AS engagements.

5) FINANCIAL & PERSONAL WELL-BEING

A committed AS participant demonstrates the ability to: Overcome barriers to employment, financial, physical, and mental well-being, and, Access community resources and services when necessary.


2020-21 High School Senior Outcomes


Of the 233 high school seniors enrolled in the Avenue Scholars (AS) program at the beginning of the 2020-21 program year:

- 203 students completed the program year, with 192 of these students (95%) graduating on time.
- 161 students persisted to postsecondary education/training. Of these students:
 - 125 are pursuing training at Metropolitan Community College or Methodist College as continuing AS participants; and
 - 36 are continuing their education at a two-year or four-year college outside of Avenue Scholars.
- 27 students entered the workforce (including 5 alums).
- 5 students entered the military.
- 30 students exited the program or moved during the year.

2020-21 Alum Outcomes

The primary metric by which AS evaluates its program is the number of students who enter full-time employment in a financially-sustaining career path. AS had 138 program alums during the 2020-21 program year, the highest annual total in its history.








Opening Doors to Great Work

Avenue Scholars (AS) emphasizes part-time employment as a critical developmental component of preparing students for career success. AS' part-time employment rates by trimester at the high school and postsecondary levels of the program for the 2020-21 program year are shown in the table below. The organization's student employment rates for July 2021 (91% for high school seniors and 96% for postsecondary students overall, with 81% of postsecondary students in industry-aligned employment) are well ahead of the national employment rate of 54.4% for 16-24 year-olds reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for the same month (U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Employment and Unemployment Among Youth – Summer 2021, 8/18/21).

to complete to become a certified Toyota technician. Amos is excelling on the job, and his service managers rave about his ability and quality of work.




MEHKI BANKS

WALTER SCOTT JR. REMEMBRANCE



When Walter Scott Jr. died Saturday, Sept. 25, at age 90, the loss was felt throughout the Omaha community — from the Henry Doorly Zoo, to the University of Nebraska at Omaha, to Avenue Scholars, to numerous other charitable organizations, medical institutions, and the business community.

As the Omaha World-Herald noted, Scott "was a giant figure in construction who left an even bigger imprint on Omaha as the city's biggest and most influential philanthropist."

Scott, reflecting on his years of supporting Avenue Scholars in the spring of 2020, expressed his pride in what the foundation has accomplished.

"Avenue Scholars Foundation started in 2008 with a simply stated but ambitious goal — to curb poverty by helping young people gain access to quality job opportunities. We're proud of the program's growth, the partnerships that have been built, and the positive impact the program has made on Omaha-area students and businesses over the past 12 years," he said.



"When I think of Walter, I'm reminded of the saying, 'Vision without action is dreaming. Action without vision is chaos. But vision and action together can change the world.' It's hard for me to think of a better example of those words than Walter Scott. His vision for the future of education and the path to improve the quality of education to ensure a positive outcome is a great example of that saying."


