Avenue Scholars staff give back to community

Avenue Scholars Foundation encourages students and clients to volunteer and give back to the community, so the Post-Secondary Team decided to lead by example in the 2017 holiday season. Under the leadership of Carnetta Hardin, the Post Secondary Team and Avenue Scholars employees engaged in two opportunities to give back and engage with the community in December.

"I feel that our staff is so blessed to be a part of the Avenue Scholars family and it is important for us to give the love and support we get every day back into the community," Hardin said. "It has also been amazing to meet with new people, discover new doors we can open for our students, and learn about new opportunities for support in the community that we can access for our students."

In their first project, the Post-Secondary Team put together boxes of everyday foodstuffs, holiday meal fixings, and gifts for a mother, her two children and grandparents living near the South Omaha Metropolitan

Community College campus.

In the second project, Avenue Scholars employees volunteered at Barnes and Noble, wrapping gifts for goodwill donations. This event raised money for Avenue Scholars students and spread the word about ASF with members of the community.

"It was a fun experience to meet with people, talk about our program, get positive feedback on our mission, and hear about wonderful programs others participate in all over the city to make Omaha a better place for everyone," Catie Dagle said.

All goodwill donations received from this project will be used to purchase cold weather gear and other identified needs for post-secondary students to access. Hardin looks forward to expanding community involvement opportunities for staff in 2018.

"I am excited to continue building the Avenue Scholars Foundation's community engagement and collaborating with all ASF staff to do more next year," she said.

Career Exploration continues making impact on Scholars

Career Exploration posts have been a key element of the Avenue Scholars Foundation mission since the fall of 2013.

Over 30 companies, or businesses, have opened their doors to students seeking hands-on insight to meaningful careers.

“When I was directed to help design the curriculum of the Career Exploration program, I wanted to try making it as hands-on as possible,” said Terry Fischer, Director of Business Outreach.

In addition, the basis on which business partners are targeted has changed.

“Previously, it was student-driven, based on student interests,” Fischer said. “Now, it’s market-driven. We want to expose students to businesses where the jobs are.”

Students are required to attend two Career Exploration posts during their junior year.

“We give them 12 to 13 choices per semester,” she said. “Once we create the menu, students choose which posts to attend.”

Fischer believes the program has been successful.

“It’s a great opportunity, one of the first chances for Scholars to see that Avenue Scholars Foundation is much more than just what happens in their ASF classroom,” she said. “For them, it’s exciting. It makes everything they’re learning more meaningful. They can see whether this is a career that might or might not be a good fit for them. They see ‘what do I need to do now’ [to achieve a career in the desired field].”

Despite all the success, Fischer sees room for growth.

“We want to offer and require more,” Fischer said. “What we do with juniors is having a high impact, but it’s not enough. We want to continue the explorations into their senior year and post-secondary as well.”

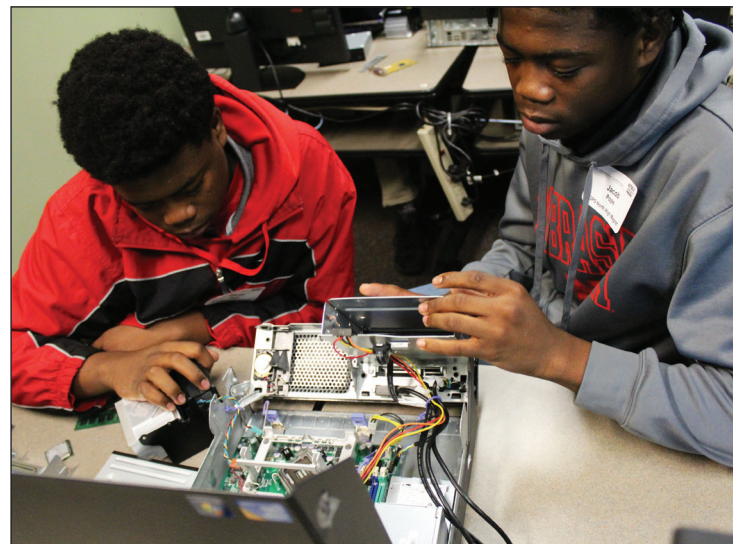
