



Scholars to benefit from Heartland Career Initiative

Earlier this year, AKSARBEN Foundation, Avenue Scholars Foundation, and Metropolitan Community College collaborated to launch the Heartland Career Initiative — a bold program designed to “prepare young men and women of hope and need for high-demand, financially sustaining vocational/technical careers in the Omaha area.”

Benefits to students include:

- **Comprehensive, Individualized Support**

– Avenue Scholars Foundation Career Coaches provide students with individualized academic, career development, and life skills support from a student’s junior year of high school, into and through postsecondary education/training, and into a career. MCC College Success Navigators assist students with college-related needs, such as course enrollment and financial aid coordination.

- **Business Collaboration** – Avenue Scholars Foundation’s business outreach team engages area businesses to provide career exploration, preparation and placement opportunities for participating students.

The AKSARBEN Foundation contributes to these opportunities by affording access to the network of Heartland business leaders who comprise its membership, as does Metropolitan Community College through its fundamental connection to business and industry.

- **Scholarship Assistance**

– The AKSARBEN Foundation and Metropolitan Community College partner together in funding the AKSARBEN-MCC Career Scholarship. Scholarship recipients receive up to \$8,000 to continue their education/training at MCC. To date, 644 scholarships valued at \$5,152,000 have been awarded to students from

across Douglas and Sarpy Counties.

Avenue Scholars Foundation is focusing on establishing more partnerships with businesses willing to provide career exploration, preparation, and placement opportunities for students. 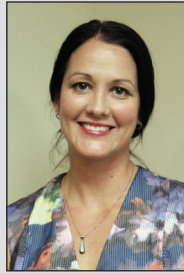

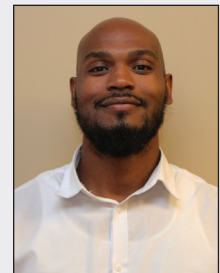

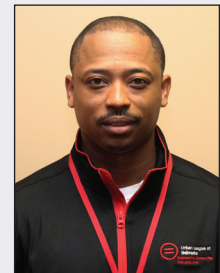

Desire to 'help people' drives career focus

For Jan Benitez, a 2010 Ralston graduate, his career path decisions have “always come down to helping people.”

It may be that modern social empathy that is driving Benitez to “pay forward” all the support, the motivation and the inspiration he’s received from family and community. His new job, as Teen Alumni Specialist for Completely Kids, appears to be a perfect fit.

“I oversee the teen employment program,” Benitez said. “I help recruit alumni, now as high school students, to be part of our programs — at elementary and middle school levels. I also provide some one-on-one mentoring.”

Additionally, Benitez facilitates workshops for the high school alumni that focus on job-readiness skills and emotional behavior skills.

Benitez says the hard work ethic modeled by his parents, who immigrated to the United States from Honduras when he was 9 years old, fuels his drive to succeed.

“They have always worked hard, pushing through all the obstacles here in America, to make a good life for their family,” he said. “The support I got from people in the community and my family has let me be myself. It came down to me putting everything to work.”

The community has included Avenue Scholars Foundation and past employers.

“Aprille Phillips was my Talent Advisor at Ralston,” Benitez said. “She was a person I could look up to and trust. When I first started high school I did not see college as an option. Aprille helped me

get through that [mindset] and find some solutions.”

As a Jim and Shirley Young scholarship recipient, Benitez was able to start his post-secondary education at Metro Community College.

“I was not sure what to study, but I felt it had to be something with helping people,” he said. “One of my advisors asked me if I had ever heard about social work.”

Benitez was admitted to the University of Nebraska-Omaha in the social work program and earned his Bachelor of Science in the field in May of 2015.

During his college years Benitez started doing volunteer work at Completely Kids. Then he was promoted to a support staff position. The last couple years of college he served as assistant coordina-

tor at Norris Middle School

“Working with the students there was really rewarding,” he said. “I was still learning a lot; I still am.”

Upon graduation from UNO, Benitez got a full-time job at One World Community Health Center as a social worker on the behavior health team. His duties included one-on-one

case management counseling. “I learned a lot, working there for

five months, but I found it was something I could not see myself doing long-term,” he said. “I heard of a position opening at Completely Kids, and here I am. Completely Kids is a great organization. I like the pace and the population, working with high school and college age students.”

Benitez also started a Master’s degree program in public administration at UNO, with a non-profit management focus.

Students explore careers at IT Bootcamp

Students learned about the IT workforce through a panel discussion, participation in group-work activities, and one-on-one discussions with IT professionals.

“The Bootcamp was a great way to unite three businesses and two non-profits to inform students of opportunities in the IT field,” said Brittani Tanhueco, ASF Business Outreach Coordinator. “Educational events such as the IT Bootcamp are crucial in ensuring Omaha is continuing to engage the future workforce in finding a career which suits them best.”
